<u>Welcome</u>: Rockhounding is best when it is shared. We welcome visitors to our meetings, anytime. If anyone has any interesting adventures they would like to share, we would love to hear about them. Our next meeting will be the third Wednesday of April (April 15th) at the Redmond Senior Center at 7:00 PM. We will be in the conference room at the east end of the center. Club officers meet at 6:00 pm.

Jewels of Knowledge:

- We want to thank The Cigar Box in Bend, Oregon, for donating a box of tumbling grit and polish to the club. In our September meeting, we will be raffling off a homebuilt vibrating tumbler (12 to 15 lb capacity). Whoever wins the tumbler will also get this box of grits and polish.
- Dr. Cheryl Byrd, DVM, from Tender Touch Vaccinations salutes everyone who takes your dogs along when you go rockhounding. Remember that your pet probably does not get out into rough terrain any more regularly than you do. So Dr. Byrd suggests when you return take a minute to check your dog for cuts, scrapes and other injuries... pay extra attention to your pet's feet.
- At the April meeting, CORC will elect a President and Vice President. Please think about volunteering, or suggesting someone, for these positions.
- We encourage everyone to pay their 2015 dues by the end of April.
- One of our past club members, Katie MacDonald is selling the rocks and equipment that she and Larry have accumulated in their years of rockhounding. She has several hundred pounds of Montana Agates, Brazilian Agates, thunder eggs and Oregon and Washington petrified wood. She is selling all the rocks at a \$1/lb). She still has a very heavy duty tumbler (\$125), and a titan diamond cabbing unit (\$1300) that appears to be in mint condition. Katie lives in Crooked River Ranch. - If you have not read the April edition of Rock and Gem magazine, I recommend it. It has an excellent article about the huge annual gem, mineral and fossil show in Munich, another article about the jade, gold, turquoise and obsidian treasures made by the ancient Mayans, and an article telling about the "Wildacres Retreat" that the Eastern Federation of Mineralogical and Lapidary Societies holds in North Carolina. Oregon tube agate found at

the Keegan Ranch near Ashwood, and around Coyle Butte in the Ochocos is highlighted as an especially fine cutting material. The same article talks about the historic Central Oregon rockhound and prospector, 'Shirts' Quant, who is credited with discovering the famous Carey Plume agate, Eagle Peak plume agate, the limbcast area along the South Fork of the Crooked River, and the Ochoco tube agate deposit.

- The Club is getting re-acquainted and up-to-date with our local rock and mineral related businesses...

- Wednesday, June 10, 10-12 (noon); The Cigar Box in Bend. See where they refurbish classic old lapidary equipment to original factory spec's. Also, they keep on-hand a wide assortment of lapidary supplies and parts.
- Saturday, September 19, 9-12(noon); Richardson's Ranch/agate beds/Museum, north of Madras. Club members get their first 5 pounds from the 'goody pile' free. You pay for whatever other treasures you decide you can't live without.
- The Club now has a new projector to use when presenting its programs. It should be able to support almost any computer input.

Our Upcoming Programs:

- Our program on 15April will be about making home-built lapidary equipment... with the focus on a 10 inch trim and slabbing rock saw. The saw being explained and demonstrated will be donated to the club. It will be raffled off at the meeting. All proceeds generated go to support the club's future activities.
- May Roger Whitehouse will be explaining 'Lost Wax Casting.'
- June Debbie Simon will give a program on Rockhounding in Nevada.
- July Julian Gray, Director of the Rice Museum, will speak about the Museum.
- August Picnic and silent auction.
- September Don Ross will be continuing his series about making homebuilt lapidary equipment. This time he will be discussing the building of a vibrating tumbler. The tumbler used in the program will be raffled off at the meeting. A home-built cabbing unit will also be discussed, and raffled off.
- October Bill Quant, son and co-prospector with Central Oregon legend, Shirts Quant, will informally discuss their rockhounding and prospecting adventures.
- November The CORC end of the season banquet.

Field trip information: We will try some new things this year. In addition to our scheduled (single day) field trips, we are attempting to add additional options which include joint field trips with other clubs, and some longer trips to more distant sites. As we get these finalized, we will be passing the specific information to everyone.

We contacted a Clackamette club that in most years makes prospecting trips to Succor Creek in the spring. We hoped to tag along, but they will not be making the trip this spring. Some of our club members are making the trip anyway, in late April, early May. Those going would be camping there about a week. Anyone interested can meet there. Succor Creek is a couple hours south of Vale, Oregon, or a couple hours north of Jordan Valley Oregon. So, it would be at least

a long weekend trip. If you are interested in making this trip, Jules Wetzel is probably the best person to get up to date information on it.

We had our first 'special' field trip on March 22. Six intrepid CORC's met outside Bandon, Oregon, for a collecting trip along the Southern Oregon beaches. The tides cooperated. The rain and hail did not. AND the winter winds had not uncovered the gravel beds enough to get to the beach agates. The members found some marine fossils, probably from the Miocene epoch, and some pretty pieces of jasper. Anyway, our hats are raised in tribute to our hardy (and somewhat waterlogged) CORC adventurers.

Bill Quant from the Quant Rock Shop offered to take our Club on an extra field trip; a special guided field to either the Quant tube agate site, or to a site for banded jasper. We can discuss this at this month's meeting.

Our Upcoming Field trips:

- April 12 Peterson's Rock Garden and museum
- May 3- Red, gold, and occasionally, green opalite from east of Madras... Tumbling sized pieces of this colorful material can be found on the ground, but you will need to dig at least 12 inches for larger pieces. The ground tends to be fairly soft and easy to dig, but I have found that a prybar tends to help to get larger pieces out of the ground. I have found pieces as big as a medicine ball at this location.
 - We will meet at 9:00 am at the Safeway parking lot in Madras.
- June Whistler Springs and Ochoco Agate thunderegg beds
- July Hollywood Ranch for petrified wood, and possible agate
- August Pat Blue Heron has arranged with the BLM geologist to view the fossil collection tucked away in the BLM office in Prineville. The tour is scheduled for Wednesday, Aug. 12 at 10:00 AM. The BLM folks won't work a weekend, and mid-week was best for them, so that is the best we can do.
- September Pole Creek to look for petrified wood, agate, jasper and stilbite
- October Tentative trip to the Sunflower Flats area of the Warm Springs Indian Reservation for red, orange and green jasper
