A membership form is on our website, which includes a liability release for field trips.

#### **Maury Mountain Moss Agate by Jules Wetzel**

I am not a FaceBook subscriber, but I do look at times at the club's FaceBook page. There seems to be an interest by rockhounds new to the hobby, or new to the area, about places to explore for good rock. One area that doesn't get much attention is the Maury Mountain moss agate beds.

The area is noted in *Gem Trails of Oregon, Rockhounding Oregon*, and the BLM's Central Oregon Rockhounding Map. The directions to the site are rather straightforward. Refer to the map, the books, or contact me. The dig site is located on the North slope of the Maury Mountains, and the access roads are through heavy timber, so snow can linger into the spring and block access. Probably mid-May is a good time to visit. Upon arrival, there is a large flat parking area facing a brushy slope. Most of the digging is on that slope, often toward the lower end.

This agate bed has been known and worked for many years. The agate was found in seams in the host rock. The old-timers told me that at one time people brought in

heavy equipment and excavated for the agate. These days rockhounds primarily pick a likely area and dig the ground looking for pieces of agate – up to several pounds size – that were overlooked by the heavy equipment folks.

The moss agate I have seen and have dug will be clear with moss of red, green or yellow. It polishes up very nicely. Bring a shovel. A Geo-pick also comes in handy. Some pieces can be found by walking the area.

Ryan Franklin (BLM) noted in his inventory of the site that the agate is scattered over a large area. The quad maps show several prospects down the hill to the Northeast and out of the normal digging area. The section to the Northeast is still National Forest, so it might be worth the effort to do some exploring in that direction.

For those wishing to camp, there is a great spot about ¼ mile back from the parking area or there is also the N.F. Elkhorn camp back at the road junction. Both would be dry camps. The Elkhorn campground has a pit toilet.

#### **2020 Dues and Junior Membership**

This year the club has a new category for membership. Grandparents may want to bring along a grandchild, or parents may want a companion for their child on a field trip. The Junior Membership for a minor costs \$5/year, and a consent form needs to be signed by the responsible adult who is a Club member. Please note: Children who live at the same address as the parents are automatically Club members under the Household Membership.

If you have not yet submitted your 2020 dues, you may mail your dues to CORC, PO Box 6265, Bend, OR 97708. Individual dues are \$20/year, and the Family/Household Membership is \$25/year. If you are a new member, please fill out the Membership Form found on the Club website.

Membership forms are also available at the meeting site for the field trips. You must be a member of the Club in order to participate in the field trips due to insurance requirements.
