## Millican: Population Zero by Patricia Moreland

Over the last several of years, driving through Millican on my way to the Brother's rest stop to meet up for a CORC field trip, I've wondered about the story of Millican, and why it's now a ghost town.

The strange story of Millican began in the 1880s, when George Millican carved out a ranch 25 miles east of Bend. With little else nearby, a small township bearing his name grew up around it. By 1913, Millican's Post Office was established, making it an official town.



Cattle was the original industry, but settlers also moved into the area under the Homestead Act (1862-1976) and were given a 160 acre plot of land where they farmed dry land wheat. After several years of drought, the homesteaders abandoned or sold off their land to larger landowners and left.

At Millican's height, the population

was around 60, and a school was established between 1913 and 1916. By 1920, the population had whittled down to one, the postmaster Billy Rahn. Rahn enjoyed being the sole resident of Millican and appointed himself the Mayor, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, Chief of Police and Chief Air Raid Warden along with his duties of postmaster and storekeeper.

US 20 was built north of the community in 1930 so the town of Millican was moved to its current location next to the highway. In 1942 Rahn retired from being the postmaster after he turned 70, which at the time, was the age limit of a postmaster. The post office was briefly run by George Petty before it was purchased in 1946 by the next longtime owner, Bill Mellin, who bought Millican and ran the gas station, store and post office. The post office closed in 1953, but the store and gas station remained open for 35 more years.

The Mellin family ran the store successfully for the first twenty years, but a series of tragedies would whittle the town back to down to zero. His daughter was killed by a drunk driver in 1971. A few years later his wife, Helen, died of a heart attack and his son, who was a pilot, died in an airplane crash in 1980.

Mellin considered selling the 75 acre community, but was reluctant and priced the town at three times the assessed value. In 1988 Mellin was robbed and murdered by the only store employee who was a parolee from the Oregon State Prison.

The town never recovered from Mellin's murder, and Millican was sold several times before it was purchased by Bruce Resnik in 2002. The store was reopened in 2002, but closed for good in 2005. Millican lasted as long as it did, because at the time, wagons could only travel about 15 miles, and cars less than 100. Millican provided gasoline on the highway between Burns and Bend.

In 2017, the town was back on the market for the price of 1.5 million, but so far, it isn't a price anyone is willing to pay.

### **Northwest Federation Newsletter**


